Critical service worker contact exemption	Close contact exemption scheme to help keep critical supply chains running though Omicron launches	From today, businesses and organisations can register online as a critical service if they think they will meet the criteria when New Zealand enters Phase 2. Critical service workers who are close contacts of COVID-19 cases can keep going to work instead of isolating if they return a negative rapid antigen test. Critical services include food production and its supply chain, key public services like health and emergency services, lifeline utilities such as power and water supplies, transport, critical financial services, news media and social welfare. "Bubble of one" contact exemption	Guidelines have been confirmed for people who either work alone, or can do so	These workers will be able to continue operating in a "bubble of one" if they are identified as a contact. These guidelines apply to any workers, not just critical workers, and do not require them to return regular tests. These changes strike a balance between continuing to keep people safe, but also keep businesses and services operating as smoothly as possible.	Min Hipkins and Min Verrall PR, 10 Feb

Big Boost Week update	Tuesday is the start of the Big Boost Week, with pop-up vaccination clinics and extended hours across the country	People are encouraged to get their booster today, it's the best time to do so, before Omicron takes off significantly. Northland has more than 40 clinics up and running. Hawke's Bay has extra weekend booster clinics. Auckland metro has more than 350 sites open including a new one at The Cloud, with four major drive-throughs, and South Island DHBs have also extended hours with a drive-through in Dunedin. From today the extra 1 million people who can get their booster now will receive a text or email alert.	PM's post- cab stand- up, 8 Feb

Flu vaccines	Up to 2 million New Zealanders will be eligible for free flu vaccination in 2022	The Government will fund a quarter of a million more flu vaccines for this year's winter campaign to protect vulnerable communities and the health system. MoH and PHARMAC are currently updating the eligibility criteria for a free flu vaccination with a focus on reducing the age of eligibility for at-risk populations, and potentially including a wider range of young people. Currently flu vaccinations are free for pregnant women, over 65s, and people who have certain medical conditions including those with cancer and diabetes. The flu vaccine can be safely administered at the same time as the COVID-19 vaccine - whether that be a booster shot or paediatric vaccine.	Min Little PR, 8 Feb
Vaccine donations	New Zealand gives vaccines to Tonga, Samoa	Aotearoa New Zealand is donating an additional 9,300 doses of the Pfizer COVID-19 vaccine to Tonga, and 10,000 doses to Samoa. Booster programme update	The Big Boost Week is now in full swing, with 56,257 booster doses administered yesterday	 This brings the total so far to more than 1.7 million – 55% of those eligible. With Omicron in New Zealand, the best thing people can do is get their booster as soon as eligible. Boosters lower the chances of getting very sick and being hospitalised. They also help slow the spread of the virus. People are urged to have personal plans ready, and follow the key public health advice of getting vaccinated, boosted, tested (if symptomatic) and masking up. 	MoH site, 10 Feb

Paediatric vaccines	1,941 paediatric doses administered yesterday	 To date, 204,727 first doses has been administered to 5-11-year-olds (43%). The decision for the vaccination of children solely sits with parents, caregivers and whanau – the Government's job is to make sure they have all the advice, support and information to make that decision.
